Horticulture CRSP in East Africa

W ith funds from the U.S. Agency for International Development, Horticulture CRSP has supported nearly \$2.6 million in horticultural research projects that affect smallholder farmers in East African countries.

Seed systems:

• Implementing drying beads for seeds in Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda and Rwanda

Improving production and extension:

- Testing nets and floating row covers in Kenya
- Improving production of indigenous African leafy vegetables in Kenya and Tanzania
- Increasing smallholder use of grafting and tunnels for tomatoes and peppers in Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda

Enabling industry and innovation:

- Developing a participatory extension model in Democratic Republic of the Congo and Uganda
- Developing energy solutions for horticultural production in Kenya
- Strengthening farmer groups to increase vegetable production in Uganda

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
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Meeting locations
