

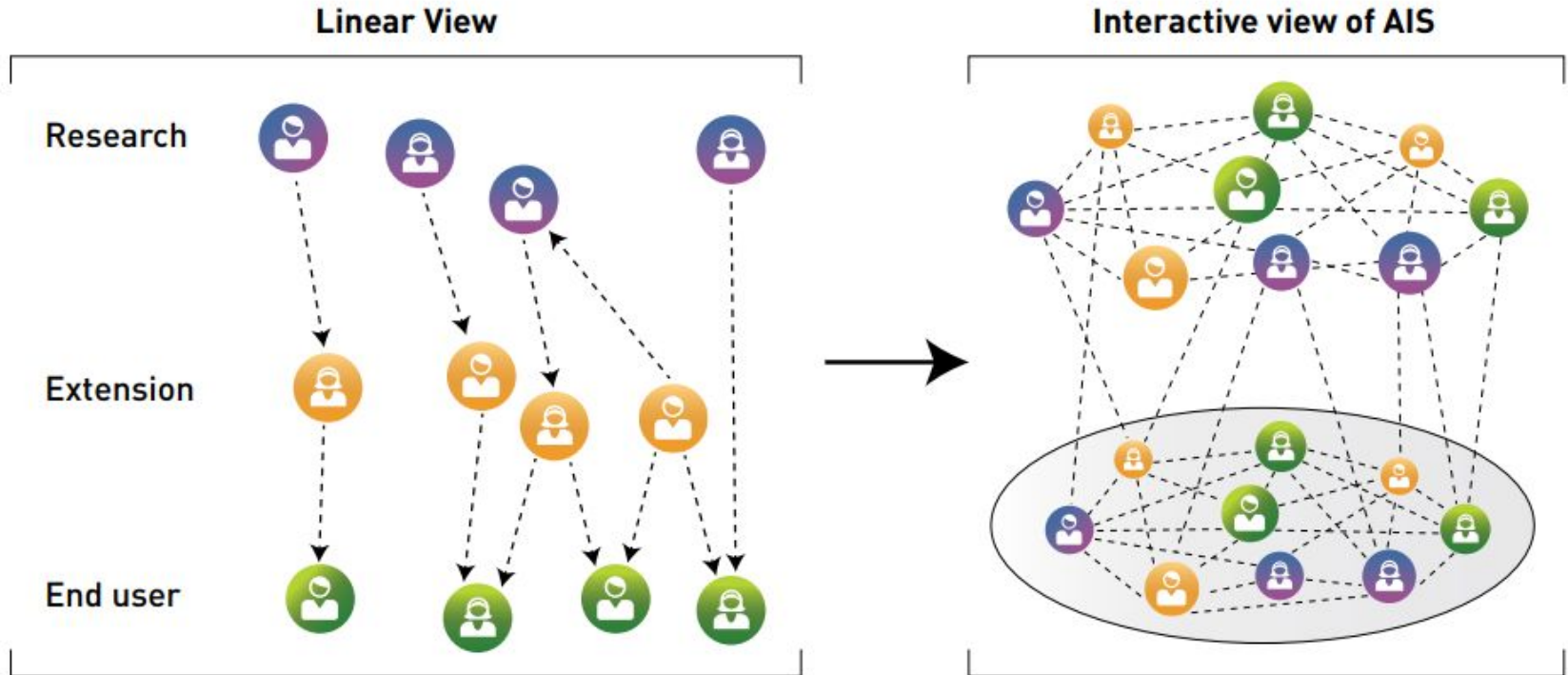

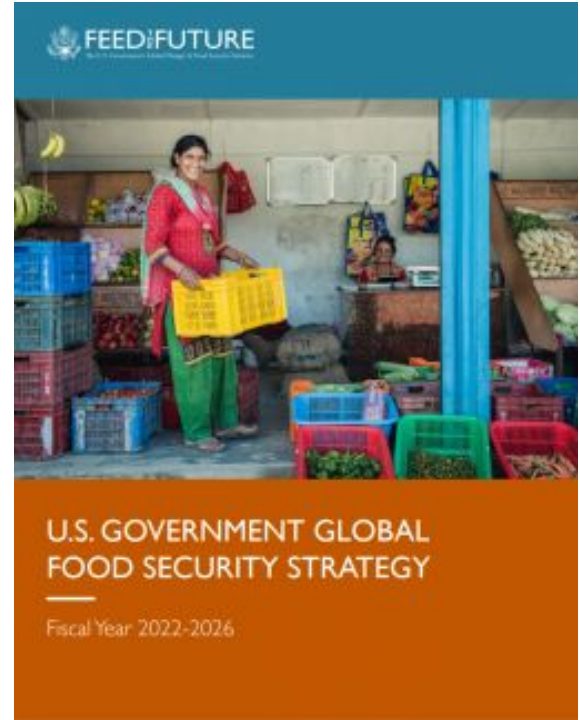

Scaling Up for Impact

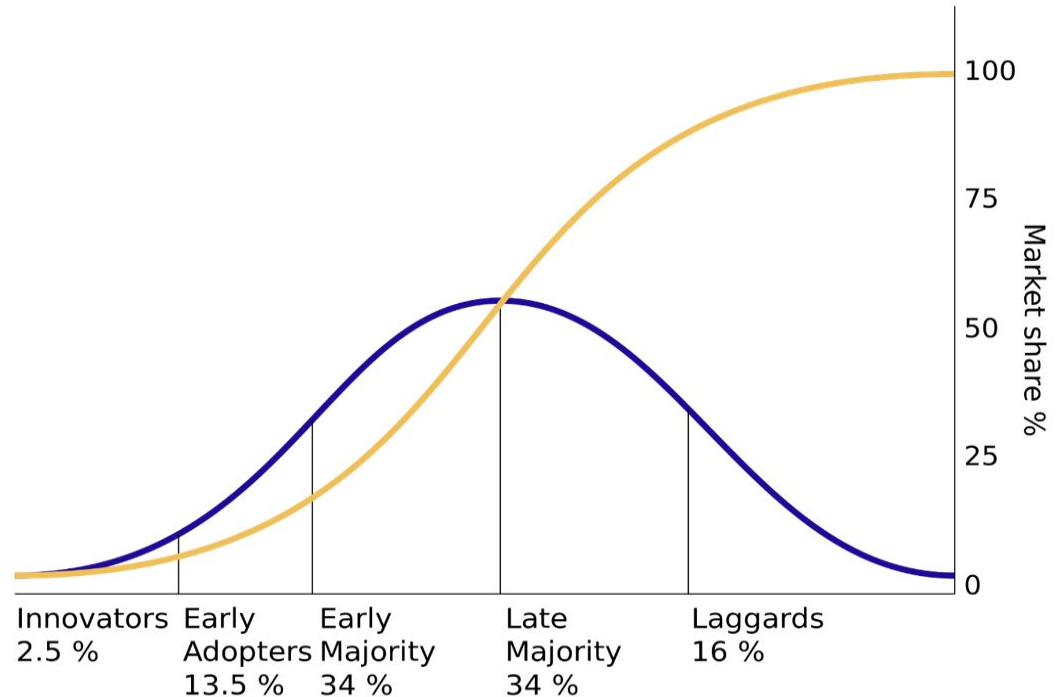
Inclusive and sustainable agriculture-led growth requires widespread adoption of improved technologies, practices, and approaches by all system actors, including local service providers, input suppliers, smallholder producers, and processors...by developing and strengthening public and private delivery pathways to link appropriate solutions to demand.



Scaling for widespread adoption of proven technologies and practices:

The process of sustainably increasing the adoption of a credible technology or practice, or a package of technologies and practices, with quality to retain or improve upon the demonstrated positive impact of the technology or practice and achieve widespread use by stakeholders.

Diffusion of Innovations Model: Rate of Adoption + S-curve

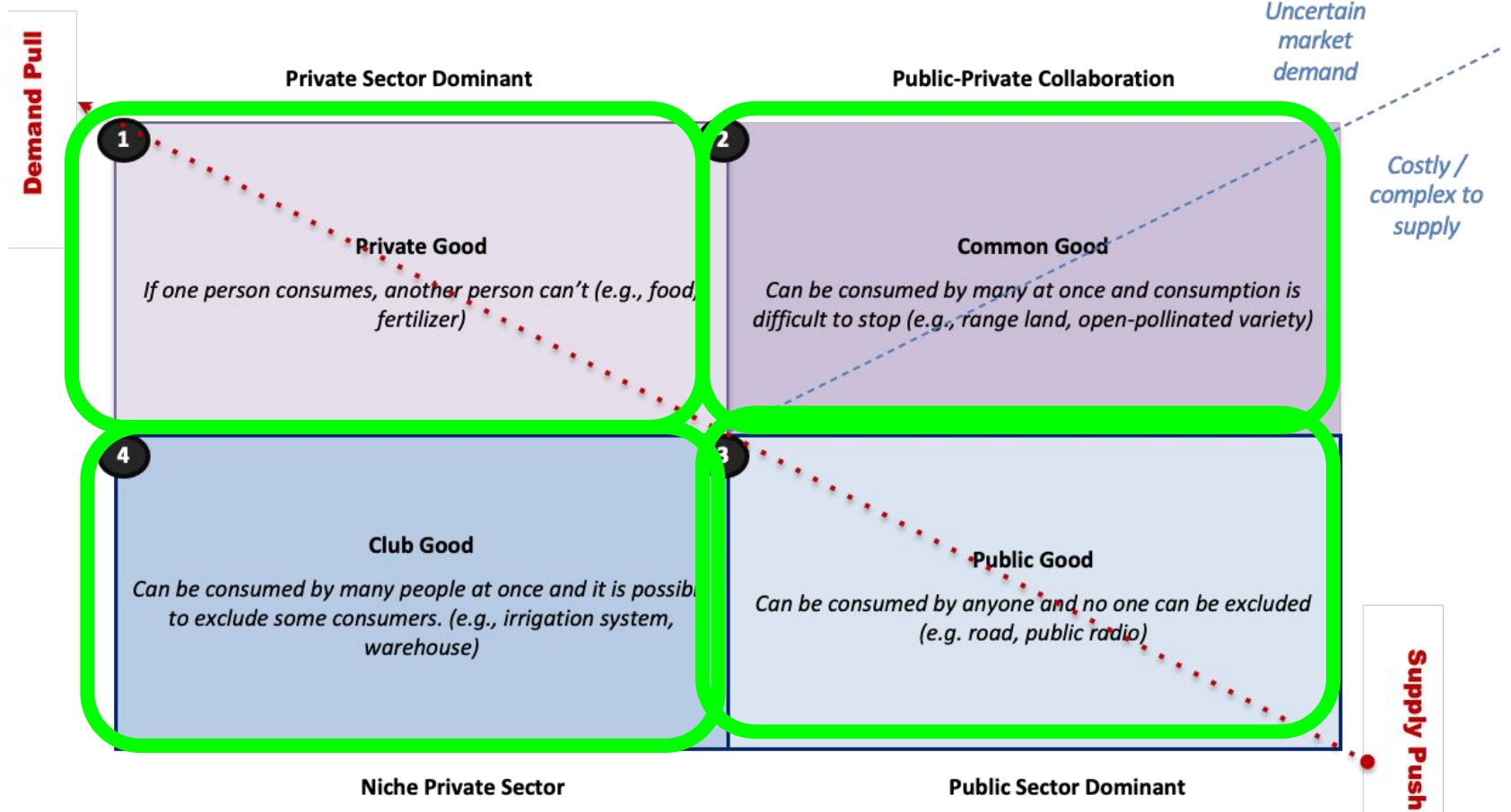

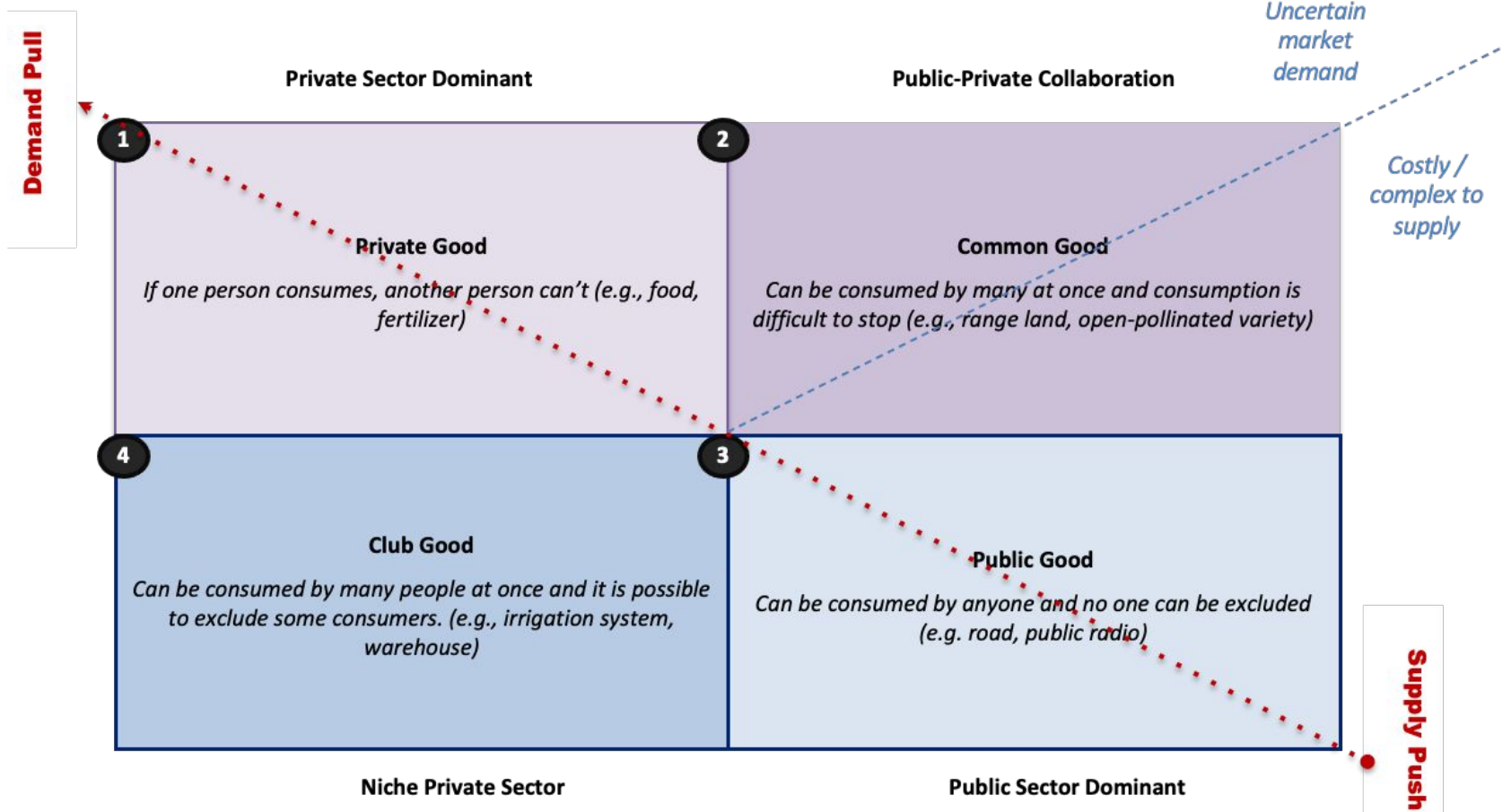

Inclusive Development

Inclusive development is the concept that “every individual and community, of all diverse identities and experiences, is instrumental in the transformation of their own societies”.



Global Context for Inclusive Development

More inclusive economies with less income inequality are associated with greater political and social stability and more sustainable and resilient economic growth.



- If **women** had the same access to resources and opportunities as men, they could increase their yields 20-30% and reduce the number of hungry people in the world by 12-17%.



- **Nearly 90% of more than 1 billion 15-24-year-olds** globally live in developing countries, mostly in rural areas. They often piece together mixed livelihoods amid a “missing jobs” crisis, yet can be key drivers of food systems transformation.

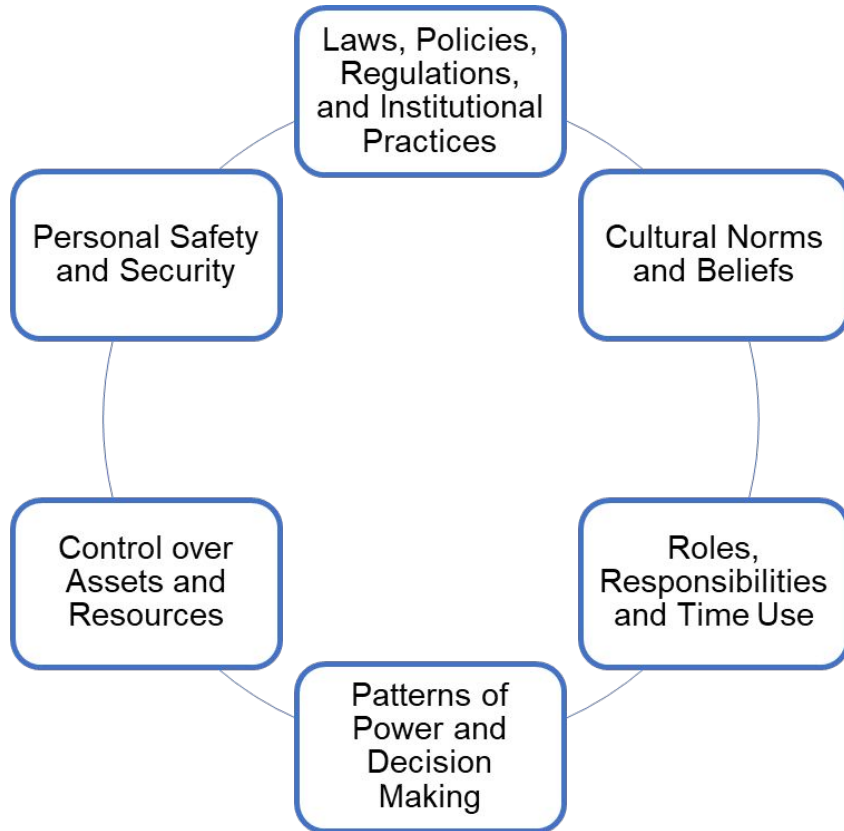


- **Localization** is closely linked to USAID’s **inclusive development approach**, which ensures that all people – including those who are marginalized or underrepresented – are fully included and can actively participate in, and benefit from, development processes.



- Projected increases in **digital** tool use by farmers in Africa is expected to go from from 33 million in 2019 to 200 million by 2030, with enormous potential for increasing inclusion.

Inclusive Development Analysis Domains



- What are the key issues, barriers, or inequalities in the domain that could affect outcomes? Which identify group(s) are affected by the issue, barrier, or inequality?
- What other information is needed to understand the inclusion challenges in each domain?
- What specific barrier/inequality and/or opportunity/entry point can be addressed through a new or improved intervention?
- How can the identified barrier/inequality be addressed?

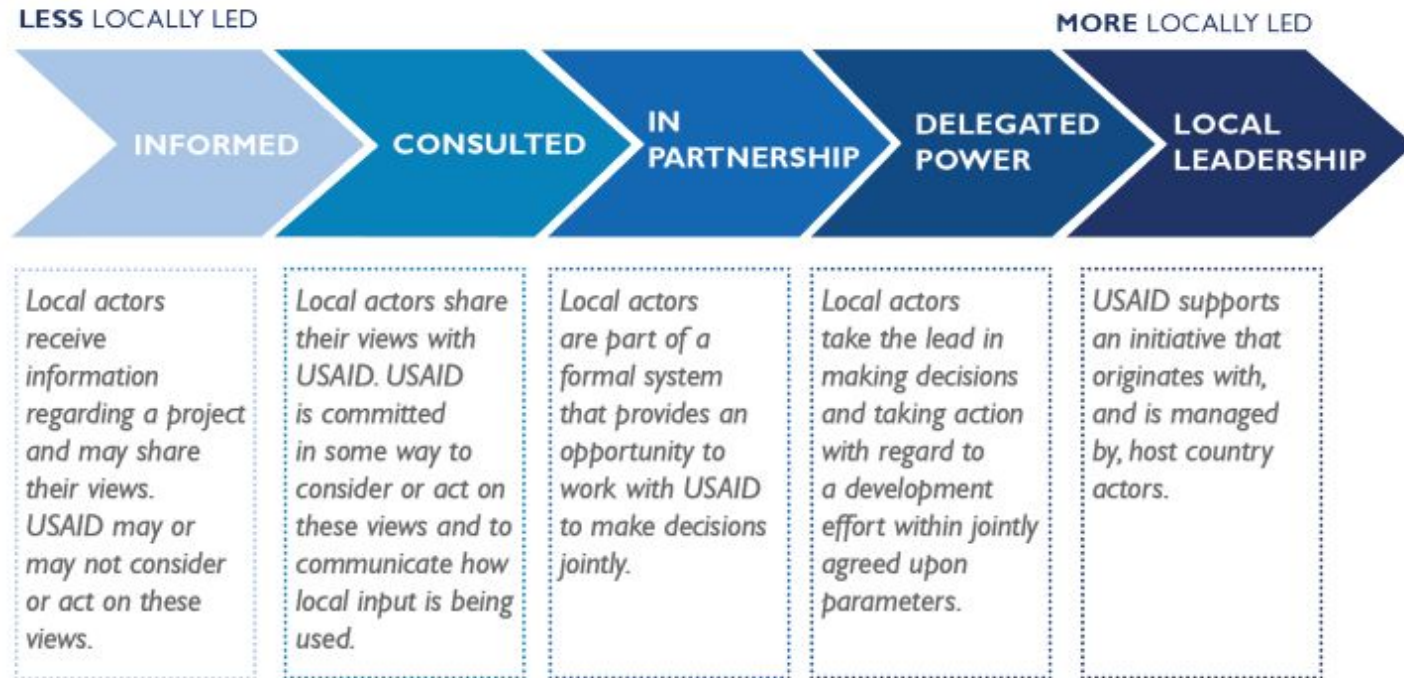
3 mutually-reinforced practices:

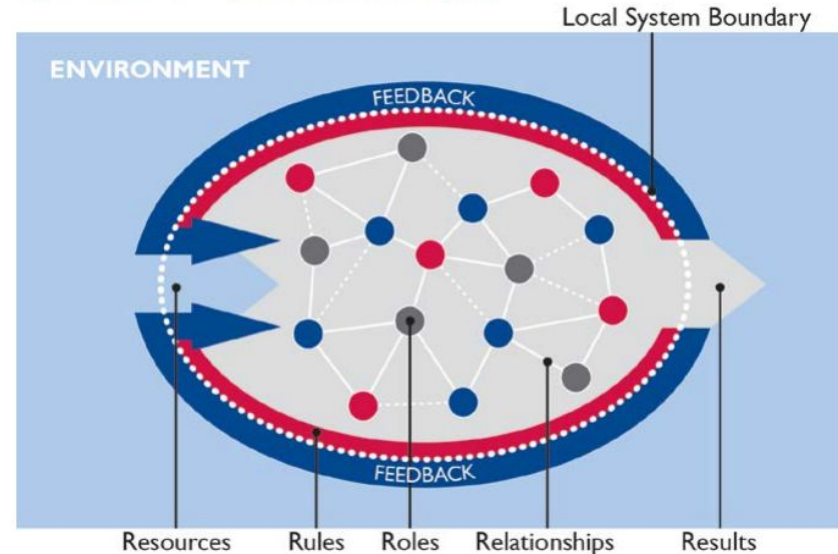

Approach: Local Systems Practice

Systems practice is an ongoing process, but can be usefully divided into four phases:

- **Listening** to the system to appreciate how it currently operates;
- **Engaging** the system to prompt change, primarily through selected interventions designed to modify interactions in ways that produce desired results;
- **Discovering** the actual effects of those interventions on the system; and
- **Adapting** interventions in response to discoveries to promote interactions that yield improved results.

PRINCIPLES FOR EFFECTIVE PROGRAMMING OF LOCAL CAPACITY STRENGTHENING

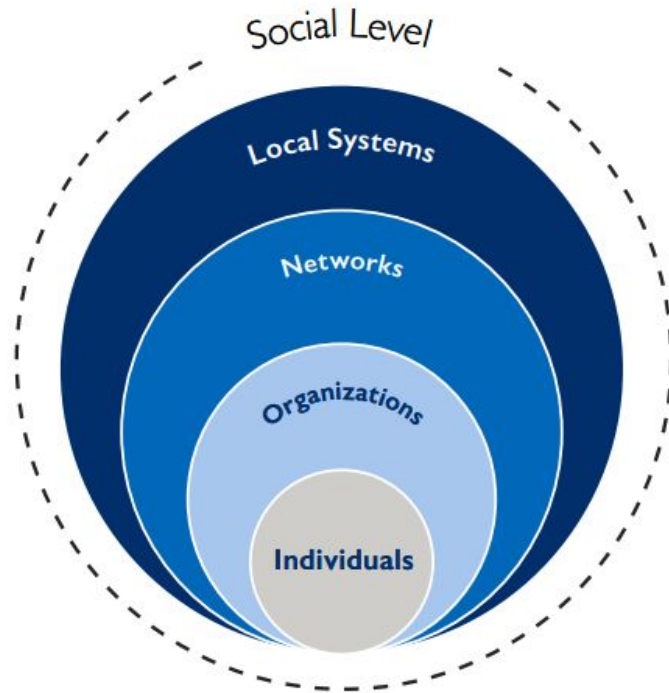
-  Start with the local system.
-  Strengthen diverse capacities through diverse approaches.
-  Plan for and measure performance improvement in collaboration with local partners.

PRINCIPLES FOR EQUITABLE PARTNERSHIPS IN LOCAL CAPACITY STRENGTHENING

-  Align capacity strengthening with local priorities.
-  Appreciate and build on existing capacities.
-  Be mindful of and mitigate the unintended consequences of our support for local capacity strengthening.
-  Practice mutuality with local partners.

Capacity Strengthening Approaches Across Social Levels



Local Systems. A local system performs well when its individuals, organizations, and networks have the capacity to perform roles and develop relationships that enable them to jointly produce and sustain locally valued solutions to humanitarian and development challenges.

Networks. At the network level, effective capacity strengthening approaches facilitate and support the ability of multiple actors to coordinate, cooperate, and collaborate to achieve collective impact.

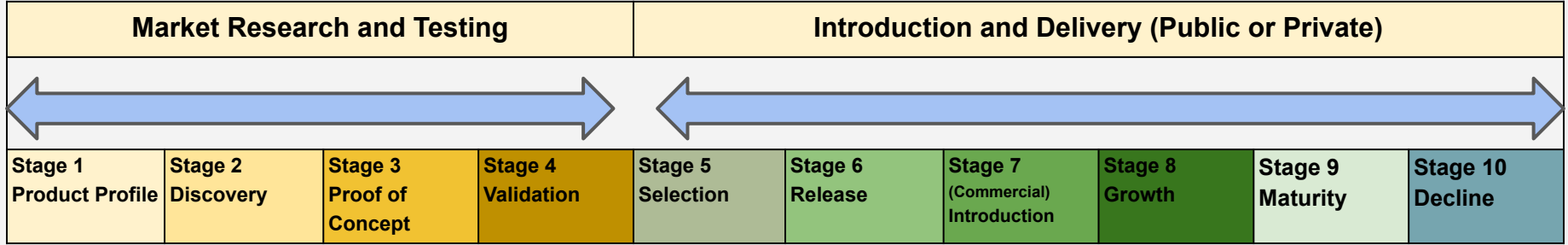
Organizations. Organizational capacity strengthening supports organizations, a group of people who work together in an organized way for a shared purpose, to achieve their strategic aspirations and deliver results for the stakeholders they serve. Organizational capacities related to human, physical, financial, and technological systems are interdependent. They should be addressed as relevant for supporting organizations' contributions to sustainable development.

Individuals. At the individual level, culturally relevant adult learning approaches foster an appreciation for lifelong learning. These approaches offer safe learning environments, respect for learners, and opportunities to immediately apply new knowledge, skills, or attitudes and then reflect on that new practice.
